WE ARE ALL Evangelizers

(and whatever else is on Deacon Eric's mind)

Knowledge and Love

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you," (Jer 1:5)

"It's a good thing for me, that you loved me before you knew me," (Deacon Eric, Sunday May 30, 2021).

The Jeremiah quote is God speaking to Jeremiah, calling him to be a prophet. The bible footnote for the Jeremiah quote tells us that the Lord's words "I knew you" mean "I loved you and I chose you."

The Deacon Eric quote is just one of his typical flippant remarks at the end of a short dialogue between the deacon and his wife that went like this:

Deacon: "left back pocket - wallet,

left front pocket - rosary, right front pocket - phone, in hand, car keys. I'm ready to go."

Wife: "What are you talking about?"

Deacon: "Just going through my checklist so I don't forget anything."

Wife: "Well don't forget a hat. Otherwise, we'll be halfway there and you'll be saying 'I should have grabbed a hat and we'll probably be sitting in the sun most off the afternoon at the barbecue."

Deacon: "Wow, you really know me don't you? It's a good thing for me, that you loved me before you knew me."

When he said that, the deacon didn't realize how close to the Jeremiah passage his remark was. He thought it was more of a "Men are from Mars, Women are from Venus" kind of thing. If we plug the biblical footnote description into the deacon's comment "you knew me", however, it takes on a slightly different context - I loved you and I

chose you. The deacon liked the idea of that. Of course, the Lord "knew" all of us before he formed us in the womb - he chose all of us and he loves all of us.

Deacon Eric reflected on a prayer card he received a few years back entitled "13 Good Things God Says to All of Us." The first thing listed is "I created you out of love." The fourth thing is "I love you" three times. Later on there is a series of statements that are unique because of their order: "I have a plan for you, I call you by name, I send you. I equip you." We are called and sent, THEN the Lord equips us.

Let's keep that in mind as God calls us to evangelize and "reignite" our parish.

(The deacon wanted to have some fun with "third-person" writing today. He will return to his customary "firstperson" style next week.)

We pray the Sign of the Cross. The priest welcomes us.

Penitential Rite

We remember our sins and ask God for mercy.

Gloria

An ancient song praising God dating back to the $\mathbf{6}^{\text{th}}$ century Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, only begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen

Collect (Opening Prayer)

All of our prayers are "collected" into one, when the priest prays the opening prayer

LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading (Ex 24:3-8) When Moses came to the people and related all the words and ordinances of the LORD, they all answered with one voice, "We will do everything that the LORD has told us."

Moses then wrote down all the words of the LORD and, rising early the next day, he erected at the foot of the mountain an altar and twelve pillars for the twelve tribes of Israel. Then, having sent certain young men of the Israelites to offer holocausts and sacrifice young bulls as peace offerings to the LORD, Moses took half of the blood and put it in large bowls; the other half he splashed on the altar.

Taking the book of the covenant, he read it aloud to the people, who answered, "All that the LORD has said,

we will heed and do." Then he took the blood and sprinkled it on the people, saying, "This is the blood of the covenant that the LORD has made with you in accordance with all these words of his."

<u>Responsorial Psalm</u> (Ps.116:12-13, 15-16, 17-18) I will take the cup of salvation, and call on the name of the Lord.

<u>Second Reading</u> (Heb. 9:11-15) Brothers and sisters:

When Christ came as high priest of the good things that have come to be, passing through the greater and more perfect tabernacle not made by hands, that is, not belonging to this creation, he entered once for all into the sanctuary, not with the blood of goats and calves but with his own blood, thus obtaining eternal redemption.

For if the blood of goats and bulls and the sprinkling of a heifer's ashes can sanctify those who are defiled so that their flesh is cleansed, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from dead works to worship the living God. For this reason he is mediator of a new covenant: since a death has taken place for deliverance from transgressions under the first covenant, those who are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance.

<u>Gospel Reading</u> (Mk 14:12-16, 22-26)

On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb, Jesus' disciples said to him, "Where do you want us to go and prepare for you to eat the Passover?"

He sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the city and a man will meet you, carrying a jar of water. Follow him.

Wherever he enters, say to the master of the house, 'The Teacher says, "Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?"' Then he will show you a large upper room furnished and ready. Make the preparations for us there." The disciples then went off, entered the city, and found it just as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover. While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take it; this is my body."

Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it.

He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many. Amen, I say to you, I shall not drink again the fruit of the vine until the day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God."

Then, after singing a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

Profession of Faith (Creed)

I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Prayer of the Faithful or General Intercessions

A collection of short prayers of petition. After each petition is said the congregation will respond by saying, "Lord, hear our prayer." We pray for the Church, Her leadership, the World and it's leadership and then we pray for our parish and local needs.

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

The Liturgy of the Eucharist, along with communion, is the most sacred part of the Mass. Catholics will kneel during the Eucharistic prayer, but non-Catholics may remain seated.

Presentation of the Gifts and Preparation of the Gifts

The bread and wine are brought to the altar along with any monetary offerings for the poor that may have been collected from the congregation. These offerings as well as the bread and wine (our "first fruits") represent the offering of ourselves (our lives) to God.

Preface and Sanctus

After the Preface prayer is prayed we all join in the song of praise being sung by the saints and angels as they gather around God's thrown in heaven.

Sanctus Holy, holy, holy Lord God of hosts. Heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Eucharistic Prayer

At this time the congregation will kneel.

Pater Noster (Our Father or Lord's Prayer) Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us, and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the Kingdom, and the Power and the glory forever, Amen

Fraction Rite — Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) Communion Rite (and Prayer for Spiritual Communion)

Act of Spiritual Communion (for those worshiping at home) My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.
