WE ARE ALL Evangelizers

(and whatever else is on Deacon Eric's mind)

(I am taking a week off, my friends, to baptize my newest granddaughter in Tennessee and visit my brother in North Carolina, so please enjoy this "blast from the past." It was first published in 2018, but applies directly to the series of Gospels we are hearing at Sunday Mass this month. So please enjoy this while I enjoy my family. See you next week.)

We are the midst of a fourweek cycle of the gospel of John known as the Bread of Life discourse. After Jesus had multiplied the loaves and fishes and fed several thousand people he sailed across the Sea of Galilee. Last week these people showed up again. He told them he had bread for their soul, which is more important than bread for the body. In today's gospel, John shows us Jesus as "the living bread," promising those who eat of this bread "will live forever." In the next two weeks, he expands on that and goes deeper when he says "eat my flesh" and "drink my blood" - words that scared off many of his fringe followers.

Last week, Jesus referenced the Jews' ancestors in the desert who whined (obviously a dry whine) because all they received from the Lord was manna. He then called them to the bread of life. If we are to be effective evangelizers, we need not only receive the Eucharist as often as we can. but we need to embrace this "living bread' concept - to live it out to the point where those we evangelize can see the spiritual energy we draw from it. They will then hunger for it themselves.

We referred in recent months to Anthony Mullen's work (*The Only Way Evangelization Succeeds*) which says point blankly that evangelization without "conscious reliance on the Holy Spirit" will fail. In seeking to "live the love of God poured out by the Holy Spirit," Mullen says we must receive the Eucharist worthily and as often as possible.

We've talked here repeatedly about the difficult nature of evangelization. Any difficult task becomes easier, however, if it is shared. In sharing our evangelization efforts with Jesus and the Holy Spirit, our yoke becomes lighter. So as these summer days start to wind down, let's set our sights on seeking the living bread, seeking the Holy Spirit and seeking to share our faith with others.

The Story of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Information from franciscanmedia.org

On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII defined the Assumption of Mary to be a dogma of faith: "We pronounce, declare and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma that the immaculate Mother of God, the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthy life, was assumed body and



soul to heavenly glory." The pope proclaimed this dogma only after a broad consultation of bishops, theologians and laity. There were few dissenting voices. What the pope solemnly declared was already a common belief in the Catholic Church.

We find homilies on the Assumption going back to the sixth century. In following centuries, the Eastern Churches held steadily to the doctrine, but some authors in the West were hesitant. However by the 13th century there was universal agreement. The feast was celebrated under various names - Commemoration, Dormition, Passing, Assumption - from at least the fifth or sixth century. Today it is celebrated as a solemnity.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's assumption into heaven. Nevertheless, Revelation 12 speaks of a woman who is caught up in the battle between good and evil. Many see this woman as God's people. Since Mary best embodies the people of both Old and New Testaments, her assumption can be seen as an exemplification of the woman's victory.

Furthermore, in 1 Corinthians 15:20, Paul speaks of Christ's resurrection as the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep.

Since Mary is closely associated with all the mysteries of Jesus' life, it is not surprising that the Holy Spirit has led the Church to believe in Mary's share in his glorification. So close was she to Jesus on earth, she must be with him body and soul in heaven
