

72 And Counting

Skeptics may say you can make statistics say anything, but when it comes to the first century Jewish culture, numbers can have very specific meanings. For example, to the Jews, seven symbolizes perfection. It has its roots in the Creation story where God rested on the seventh day because his work was complete. The number twelve, or a multiple of it, often is a symbol for the twelve tribes of Israel or the twelve apostles. Such was the case in last week's gospel from Luke.

"The Lord appointed a further seventy-two and sent them in pairs before him to every town and place he intended to visit." (Lk 10:1) Seventy-two, of course, is a multiple of twelve, and in this instance references the number of nations in the world at that point. Luke makes an interesting point that the dis-

ciples were sent out in pairs. There are many ways to evangelize, and doing so in pairs is a very effective one.

In his assessment of this gospel selection, Bishop Robert Barron reminds us that "We are a missionary Church. We are sent by the Lord to spread his word and do his work. The Christian Gospel is just not something that we are meant to cling to for our own benefit." There are several reasons, he says, why they went in pairs: to establish teamwork, provide witness, and to create a built-in support system.

Bishop Barron continues: "We do this work together, with others, in community. Ministers need people to support them and pray for them. Francis has an experience of God and then, within months, gathers people around him; Dominic, from the beginning, has brothers in his work; Mother Teresa attracted a number of her former students to join her in her mission."

We all could take a lesson from this, especially if we have

sometimes felt alone and a bit insecure when trying to spread God's Word. Asking a friend or family member to join us when talking to someone who has fallen away or is seeking the Lord can help us take that first step.

Bishop Barron reminds us that the Gospel is not just for individual use. Quiet prayer helps us grow in understanding it, but our job is also to share it; and doing so with another disciple is a great route to take. The disciples in last week's gospel enjoyed zapping demons like we might pick off mechanical ducks at the Ionia Free Fair. Jesus reminded them that the power to cast out demons was secondary to having their names written in heaven. Though we may not have that power, we can spread the word of the Lord and work toward getting our names on that list.

Metamorphosis: How a Regular Guy Becomes a Deacon (Deacon Eric Elstro's Journey to the Diaconate)

The Call:

Did you ever get a call that you didn't expect? You know the type that kind of left you confused, wondering if it was intended for you or not? That's a lot like it was for me in the Spring of 2013. I had been looking for more in my faith, but could never get enough. I told Adult Faith Director Nancy Joseph that I felt like a sponge that couldn't be saturated. She asked if I had ever considered the diaconate; and though I had doubts the

diocese would accept me at age 61, I started discerning.

For weeks on end, I repeatedly read and contemplated Jesus' words, "Those who have ears to hear ought to hear." But I heard nothing until, like Deacon Marv, I challenged the Lord for an answer to the question "Do you want me in the diaconate formation program or not? Classes start in two weeks." In very "Jesus-like fashion," his reply came in the form of a question: "Can **you** cut that last tether preventing you from giving yourself totally to me?" When I answered "Yes," he removed all obstacles for me on the way to ordination in May 2019. Eric, the regular guy in the pew, became Deacon Eric. The metamorphosis was complete.

The Ministry:

Deacon Marv did a great job in describing the role of deacon in the modern world as a minister of the Word, minister of the altar, and the minister of charity. We preach the gospel and assist the priest during Mass. We are also allowed to preside over funeral services, Baptisms, and weddings. But, the call to the diaconate is also a call to community. My primary focus outside of the church building is taking the Eucharist to parishioners who are no longer able to attend Mass. For me, that means taking Jesus to individual homes and residents at Grace Haven.

It's hard for me to identify what brings me the greatest joy because differing roles generate different emotions. There's a satisfaction in knowing that people appreciate me not only for bringing them the Eucharist, but for taking 15-20 minutes to sit and talk with them. There's a different warmth I feel when bringing the Lord's peace to those who are mourning. I relish helping parishioners to better understand their faith. I enjoy preaching and writing my Sunday column. Baptisms have their own spiritual satisfaction. I could go on and on, but in the end, I guess my greatest joy is that the Lord called me to the diaconate and gave me an opportunity to serve others in his name.

Graces:

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A couple of months before I was ordained, I lunched with a deacon who was in the previous diaconate class. I asked him what the biggest change was that I would sense after being ordained. He told me, "Graces like you have never imagined." He was 100 percent accurate. And that is the message I would like to leave with anyone who is even remotely curious about looking into the diaconate. The time and effort that goes into diaconate formation is significant, but the spiritual reward and consolations from the Lord are indescribable. An added bonus is how much my wife, Mary Beth, has grown spiritually as she's walked by my side through formation and my early deacon years. So, I heartily urge those even remotely curious about this ministry to talk to me or my fellow deacons. You've got nothing to lose and infinite graces to gain.


