Mercy, Hope and Second Chances

We know we have a merciful God, but sometimes we push our luck. The Israelites constantly tested God in the desert, even though he had led them out of slavery in Egypt. Today's first reading from Exodus shows God's reaction to the molten calf the Israelites had made to worship, while Moses was up on Sinai receiving the Ten Commandments. His words to Moses: "Let me alone then, that my wrath may blaze up against them to consume them."

Then Moses, who was none too happy with his people either, then played the role of mediator. Like Abraham, who bought some time for the people of Sodom through a series of negotiations (very loosely defined here), Moses reminded the Lord of his promises to Abraham, Isaac and Israel. So this "God of second chances" granted the first of many second chances he would give the Israelites going forward, and pulled the plug on his plan to consume them. In doing so, he granted them hope. It was hopeless, then there was hope for God's Chosen People.

For the Prodigal Son (whose story was included only in the long version of today's gospel), his life also went from seemingly hopeless to hopeful. G.K. Chesterton described that line between hope and hopeless like this: "In the struggle for existence, it is only on those who hang on for ten minutes after all is hopeless, that hope begins to dawn." The younger son, who had insulted his father by demanding his share of the family estate (normally passed on after a father's death), found himself hanging on "ten minutes after all was hopeless." He didn't have a mediator such as Abraham or Moses to appeal for mercy to his father, but sought it on his own. It was granted, for he too, had a "father of second chances."

The message of hope when all seems hopeless is as true today as it has ever been. We can easily be overwhelmed by the negative news that's constantly in the news media. We can be worn down from trying to fight the fight for a moral society or religious freedom. We can be exhausted from the personal hardships in our lives. Or we can find strength and hope "ten minutes after all is hopeless," by turning to the source of all hope, Jesus. God will grant us mercy if we have wronged him, but we have to ask for it. He will grant us his strength, if we turn to him in praver.

Annual Cooperative MISSION APPEAL

Next weekend, at all Masses, Rev. Raju Pilla will be speaking about the works and the needs of the Latin Archdiocese of Trivandrum in India.

Trivandrum has about 270,000 Catholics. Approximately 90% of the people are traditional fishermen who depend on the fishing for their livelihood and 10% are farm workers who are recent converts from the low caste Hindus. Unemployment and poverty are most rampant in this community.

The Archdiocese depends on outside assistance to support its clergy, seminarians, catechists and to continue its developmental program. However, during the pandemic lockdown, the situation is very pitiful as the fishermen are restricted from fishing which is their livelihood. With income halted from fishing, the people are struggling to support themselves.



Recent Cyclone "Tauktae" that swept through the coastal villages in May 2021, destroyed hundreds of homes. They are looking for emergency assistance for food, medicine, and housing.

We will have a second collection after communion at next weekend's Masses. You can also drop off a donation at the parish office this week.

Renovation Reflection -Family Room

A popular feature of homes in the 1970s was to have both a living room and family room. Walls of family rooms were often covered with paneling, with carpeted floors. Family rooms would often have ceiling fans and few windows. The room could be used as a den, game room, or just a place to quietly relax.

OUR FAMILY ROOM

In the 1958-59 addition and remodel, paneling was added around the worship space. Visually, the church, especially the addition, was somewhat remi- CONTINUITY niscent of a family room. Why paneling? Was it because this was a common wall covering at the time? Because paneling would have worn better than paint? Was the organic nature of wood important to worshippers at the time? The geometry of the vertical lines, directing the eye upwards to heaven? Was it purely a matter of keeping costs low?

STICKS, THEN STONES

With the renovation of St. Joseph church, the paneling will be removed. What is wrong with paneling? After all, isn't the church, among many things, a "family room?" Nothing is wrong with paneling - wood is one choice among many. However, the paneling was well worn, and not the best choice of material for places with a lot of traffic. Besides easy maintenance of materials, one of the goals of the renovation is to provide a consistent look throughout all ICON OF GOD of the worship space. While paneling previously did that for the main nave of the church and the addition, the sanctuary walls broke that unity and were painted.

With the renovation, the walls of the entire worship space (main nave of the church, addition, and sanctuary) will be covered with a product with the appearance of marble. That continuity throughout the entire worship space, especially the addition, is essential to worship. As the U.S. Bishops wrote: "The body of the church is not simply a series of unrelated sections. Rather, each part contributes to the unity of the space by proportion, size, and shape."

BALANCE.

Also, with wood pews, wood paneling, and wood trim, much of the visual interest of individual wood elements was lost. On the walls, with only the trim of windows and doors remaining in wood, the visual appeal of each will be emphasized all the more.

Yet, marble also conveys a sense of the God we worship. Marble has an appearance of solidness, like our everlasting and eternal God. Finished stone reflects light, as should we reflect the Light of Christ.

MIGRATION.

This change for St. Joseph parishioners is similar to one undertaken by the early Church. When the Jewish Christians were expelled from the Temple, they began meeting in homes, which were made of less durable rough stone and mudbrick, with little wood (only on roofs). As communities grew, they moved to public spaces, made of more finished stone and perhaps even tile.

Hmmm, look at us, following in the footsteps of our worshiping

What the Catholic Tradition Has to Say About What Should Come Next

Speaker- Dr. Charlie Camosy
