

# Understanding "Understanding"

My wife and I spent last Sunday with our son and his family as we celebrated his birthday. Part of the celebration included watching the Detroit Lions season opener, which, true to tradition, ended with the Lions losing a close game. But since it is part of tradition, we didn't let it (or the off-and-on Sunday rain) dampen our spirits. We still had a birthday to celebrate and young grandkids to play with.

Because both of my son's children are under the age of four, there is an obvious gap in communication with them. "Understanding" levels are understandably much different--young children can't always understand adults and vice versa. We adults sometimes have to rephrase an idea, using different, usually simpler, words to express our thoughts. (In certain situations "tone of voice" helps convey those thoughts.) As adults, especially parents and grandparents, we need to be patient as we teach the children words so that they may better express themselves. While communicating with a two-year-old, it pays to listen very closely to him/ her to perhaps understand the child's thoughts.

Even among adults, I believe there is a tremendous lack of understanding. Within our church, I believe that if more people firmly understood our Catholic faith then we would not have had the exodus from our Church that we've experienced the past 20 years. Even among those who "believe" there are those who do not understand. Today's gospel is a good example. A dishonest steward is fired for squandering his master's money, but through some wheeling and dealing, he opens some doors for future employment and is commended for acting prudently by his master. The bottom line is that we need to choose between God and money. Understanding that passage fully is difficult without some bible study.

Understanding the proposed "abortion without restriction" constitutional amendment on the statewide ballot in November (Proposal 3) is extremely important for us. Beyond the number one reason that Catholics should vote "No"--Catholic teaching that life is sacred from conception to natural death there are the practical dangers of such a drastic amendment: **no parental control**, no penalties on those who may botch an abortion, and legalization of killing a child in the womb right up until birth. If passed, Michigan will become an abortion mecca.

"Understanding" is, of course, a gift of the Holy Spirit. Shortly after assuming the papacy, Pope Francis described this gift as "to understand a situation in depth, as God understands it". Pope Francis further clarified that understanding moves us beyond merely agreeing with what God has revealed to taking seriously what His revelation means for our everyday decisions. It's time for us all to pray to ask the Holy Spirit for an ability to understand "Understanding" and how to put it to use.

The Search features people from all walks of life, and their search for meaning.


