PATIENCE IS A VIRTUE

It seems a couple young girls were visiting their Great Grandma one Advent. After excusing themselves to go to the bathroom, they did not return to the family gathering for quite a while. So Great Grandma went looking for them only to find them in front of her bedroom closet door discussing(?) which of them was going to get the doll they had just discovered. They both had reguested that doll for Christmas. GG shooed them away from her closet and told them they would just have to wait and find out on Christmas, Great Grandma of course, as GG's do, went on Amazon the next day and ordered a second doll to please them both.

Kids can't help themselves at this time of year. Their curiosity gets the best of them and they go searching for gifts all around the house. If you try to tell them to wait --that patience is a virtue, they get

those cartoonish question marks in their eyes. Virtue just can't stand up to an inquiring child's sense of discovery. But patience is exactly what St. James is calling for in today's second reading, saying:

Be patient, therefore, brothers, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You too must be patient. Make your hearts firm, because the coming of the Lord is at hand.

Waiting. It's not something Americans are built to do. But it is something we need to do, especially at this time of year when we do our Christmas shopping. There are waits for prime parking spots near the mall. Then there are waits in line in the stores to buy our gifts. Then, we are hungry from all the time spent shopping and waiting in lines, so we go to a restaurant drive-through where we find - you guessed it - another line to wait in for our food.

How we've handled the waits dur

ing the Christmas season goes a long way toward our state of mind when Christmas finally rolls around. Are we exhausted and just trying to get through New Years Day when we can take down all the decorations and get back to normal? Or have we used those wait periods to get closer to Jesus, perhaps saying a decade of the rosary for someone while in line?

This reading from St. James should resonate with this community, which is quite familiar with the farming analogy James uses--the patience that comes with having to depend on the unknowns of weather. Today marks the halfway point of this season. Whether our patience is being tested or not depends upon how we are using the season. If we've wandered away from our Advent promise to prepare for the Lord's coming, there's still time to get back on track. (And parents, find a better hiding spot for kids' gifts than your closet. That makes it way too easy for them.)





Courage:

Courage is a group of Catholics who experience same-sex attractions and who are committed to helping one another to live chaste lives marked by prayer, fellowship and mutual support. Our members are guided by caring priest chaplains who offer reconciliation and direction for the spiritual life. Together they pursue the Five Goals of Courage:

- 1. To live chaste lives in accordance with the Roman Catholic Church's teaching on homosexuality. (Chastity)
- To dedicate our entire lives to Christ through service to others, spiritual reading, prayer, meditation, individual spiritual direction, frequent attendance at Mass, and the frequent reception of the sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Eucharist. (Prayer and Dedication)
- 3. To foster a spirit of fellowship in which we may share with one another our thoughts and experiences, and so ensure that no one will have to face the problems of homosexuality alone. (Fellowship)
- 4. To be mindful of the truth that chaste friendships are not only possible but necessary in a chaste Christian life; and to encourage one another in forming and sustaining these friendships. (Support)
- 5. To live lives that may serve as good examples to others. (Good Example/Role Model)

Encourage:

Is a group of family and friends of those who have loved ones struggling with same-sex attraction. It is a way to gain greater understanding of what your loved one is going through and how you can best support them.

From Fr. Mike:

The Importance of Mass

If I've been away from Mass for a long time, or even once, can't I just start over, and begin going to Mass again and start receiving Holy Communion?

Start coming to Mass right away, but as in the case of any other mortal sin, ask God's forgiveness immediately, but you must have all your mortal sins forgiven in the sacrament of Penance before you resume receiving Holy Communion again. Pope John Paul II wrote in Dominicae cenae, 24 February 1980, "But we must always take care that this great meeting with Christ in the Eucharist does not become a mere habit, and that we do not receive Him unworthily, that is to say, in the state of mortal sin. The practice of the virtue of penance and the sacrament of Penance are essential for sustaining in us and continually deepening that spirit of veneration which man owes to God Himself, and to His love so marvelously revealed."
