



## MORE "OLD WORDS"

(If you were tuned in last week, I explained that I had come across the commencement speech noted Catholic theologian Bishop Robert Barron gave to the graduating class of Hillsdale College in May. It was so loaded with good information that I decided to present its highlights over two weeks.)

I left everyone last week with this point to ponder from Greek philosopher Socrates: "it is better to suffer wrongdoing than to do wrong oneself." Though that thought has been challenged by other philosophers, Socrates' position is sound. Bishop Barron condenses Socrates stand on this issue thusly: "surely suffering is terrible, but what is worse is the corrosion of the soul that takes place when one commits injustice...being unjust is far more damaging to the moral structure of a person's character than enduring the slings and arrows of injustice."

Of course, Bishop Barron moved his focus from the classical Greeks to the

Scriptures and to Christianity, as one might expect from a Catholic bishop. The prophets, he notes, didn't look at the current battle for hearts as we do -- religion versus secularism. Instead the prophets saw the world as being divided between those who worshiped the one true God and those favoring idolatry or false worship.

That's best seen in the great story of Elijah against 450 followers of the pagan Baal. Elijah had what could be called a "pray-off" with the 450 Baal priests to show the power of the one true God. The priests' prayer for Baal to ignite their sacrifices failed, but Elijah went so far as to douse the wood around his altar with water three times and in one prayer to God the Lord ignited the wood and consumed the sacrificial bull.

Bishop Barron says that this is much more than a story of "My God is bigger than your god," but rather the dynamics of true and false worship. The worship at the altar of anything other than that of the one true God -- the altars of wealth, power, honor or physical pleasure will leave us feeling empty. Or in the bishop's words, "worldly things cannot, even in principle, satisfy our hungry souls." At this point he asked the students "at which altar will you worship?

Then Bishop Barron turned to his intellectual hero, St. Thomas Aquinas who noted that in order for us to live a happy life, we need to love what Jesus loved on the cross and despise what Jesus despised. Many of us seek wealth, but on the cross he was poor. Many of us worship pleasure, but on the cross he suffered greatly. Some of us worship power, but on the cross Jesus had no power. And finally, many of us seek honor. On the cross, Jesus was scorned and ridiculed. But on the cross, he loved doing the will of his Father.

In the end, this speech to young college graduates applies to all of us. We all need to ask ourselves whether we are willing to suffer wrongdoing, rather than do wrong ourselves and whether we may be worshipping at the wrong altar.

# **Eucharistic Ministers Needed for Hospital Ministry**

Lansing Catholic Hospital Ministry is looking for Eucharistic Ministers to distribute Communion to Catholic patients at Sparrow Hospital and McLaren Greater Lansing. We were away from the hospitals during the pandemic and are in a slow process of returning to the hospitals and rebuilding our ministry. A general orientation for new volunteers is provided by each hospital before a more specific training for hospital ministry is provided. Eucharistic ministers usually volunteer one day each month but may choose to volunteer more than one day a month or even one day at each hospital. This is usually a commitment of 2-3 hours but may vary slightly as the number of Catholic patients fluctuates from day to day. # Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton

Elizabeth Ann (Bayley) Seton is the first person born in the United States to be declared a saint. Born in New York on August 27, 1774, she was an Episcopalean who converted to Catholicism in 1805. Her early life was marked with loss: her mother died when she was only three years old, and her husband, William Magee Seton, who she married at age 19, died in 1803.

In 1809 Elizabeth moved to Emmitsburg, Maryland. There she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph's; this was the first community for religious women founded in the U.S. She also started St. Joseph's Academy and Free School.



## Attribute

In art, St. Elizabeth is often depicted with a rosary and holding her Bible. Our statue has shows with the Blble open, presumably to Psalm 23, which was her favorite and was frequently referenced in her journal. She may also be depicted holding alms, flowers, bread, and a pitcher, or is pictured with the poor.

Besides being from North America, St. Elizabeth was chosen to be represented in our parish due to her connection with education.

Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton is the patron saint of Catholic schools, grief, death of children, loss of parents, widows, in-law problems, sailors, and the diocese of Shreveport, Louisiana.


