



(AND WHATEVER ELSE IS ON DEACON ERIC'S MIND)

Truth -- It Sounds Simple
Writing about the truth sounds
simple, but as a person who is
not well-schooled in philosophy I
know that I may fall down a rabbit's hole if I'm not careful. So I
guess I will tread softly, while still
trying to stimulate some deep
thought.

This discussion was triggered by a quote I recently read from St. Thomas Aquinas that has stuck with me. Though his words are more than 800 years old their validity to stimulate thought are apparent. He said:

"The study of truth requires considerable effort. That is why few are willing to undertake it out of a love of knowledge -- even though God has implanted a natural appetite for such knowledge in the human mind.

There are dozens of quotes about truth that are great to ponder, but as Aquinas said, most people just don't want to exert the effort to examine it. Aquinas was a disciple of the Greek philosopher Aristotle, who famously said: "It is of the nature of man to want to know." We have a desire to know more, but in Aquinas' mind we just don't want to work for that knowledge -- especially when it involves knowledge of truth. So we often settle for some catch phrases, but no more wisdom about truth.

For example, we have the pointed yet whimsical observation of Mark Twain: "If you tell the truth, you don't have to remember anything." Then we have Galileo's scientific observation: "All truths are easy to understand once they are discovered; the point is to discover them." Even a line from a movie can have value in the right context, such as Jack Nicholson's: "You can't handle the truth" in *A Few Good Men*.

The first three quotes, although strong assertions, reflect only the secular world, but the following get to core Catholic beliefs. 'My longing for truth was a single prayer.' – Edith Stein. But the end game on truth is Jesus' 'I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life. No one comes to the Father

except through me.'

We know that the bottom line is that Jesus is the Truth. Edith Stein, canonized as Saint Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, followed that truth to heaven. Nicholson's movie character delivered the memorable "You can't handle the truth" line in a secular setting within a work of fiction, but those words could have significant spiritual value in a real life situation.

We all occasionally set aside the truths of the Catholic Church through our sins, yet many of us don't seek absolution in the sacrament of Reconciliation. It may be time to ask ourselves whether we "can handle the truths" in our own lives. If we have serious sins on our soul, it's time to handle our truths in the confessional to-day.

"Truth" sounds simple -- until we apply it to our souls.

Diocese of Kumbakonam Our 2025 Missionary Cooperation Plan Appeal Message from Rev. M. S.Selva Raj:

I humbly request you to publish this for a short message on Mission Appeal in your parish bulletin. The universal human tragedy, loss of life and financial resources, pain and deprivation of all sorts, caused by Covid-19 pandemic is beyond my description. Therefore, the mission Diocese of Kumbakonam needs your prayerful and financial help all the more. With deep and prayerful gratitude,

The Propagation of the Faith office of our archdiocese has invited the Diocese of Kumbakonam, India to participate in the Mission Cooperative Appeal in our parish this year. Here is an overview of the missionary assets, activities, challenges and the needs of the Diocese of Kumbakonam. Rev. Antony Rejesh will be here at St. Joseph Church the weekend of July 26/27, 2025

This Diocese, started in 1899 in the state of Tamil Nadu, India, has an area of 7,824 sq.km and a Catholic population of 213,000 (6% of the population), living in 94 parishes and 618 missions, served by 218 diocesan and 68 religious priests, 620 nuns,12 trained catechists and 330 untrained lay catechists and two social service centers. These are the most pressing missionary needs:

- 1. Establishing 8 more new parishes, each with a new church and rectory. The large missions need to be made independent parishes with the resident priest for better pastoral ministry, but the people are unable to give financial support.
- 2. Providing the 136 Catholic schools and 22 Orphanages in the missions with better facilities, building, infrastructure, educational and technical tools, children's Bibles, a projector, catechetical materials in the form of videos, pictures, text-books and workbooks to improve the quality of religious and faith formation of Catholic and non-Catholic students in mission-schools. Schools are our main means of ushering in progress at all levels. Education is a main means of evangelization and boosting the future prospects of the youth.
- 3. Enabling 480 nuns and 4955 Catholic Teachers in charge of catechetical, educational, medical and social ministers throughout this rural diocese, to educate the children and adults in the Catholic faith and to help the people, particularly the poor and the marginalized for their integral development, through annual seminars on Scripture and Catechetics.
- 4. Projecting the healing touch and loving care of the Divine Healer through our diocesan hospitals for lepers, homes and schools for hearing impaired children, children of HIV patients and the many rural medical clinics.
- 5. Education of more young men in the seminary since the diocese abounds in vocation to priesthood and religious life so that some could be sent as missionaries to missions abroad where there is a shortage of priests. Note: Every year an average of 120 young men and women go out of this diocese to other missions and religious orders in India and abroad as missionaries.
- 6. Educating 4800 very poor or orphan children, from families of single mothers and widows, and of addictive and abusive fathers by providing them with free board & lodging, in order to eradicate child labor. Such children are forced to tend cattle, work in hazard-ous conditions in factories, hotels or farms in order to eke out a living for the family.

All the above mission projects are 80% dependent on MCP funds, Due to acute poverty of 65% of the Catholics the diocese depends mostly on funds from annual mission appeal for the pastoral, educational, medical, and socio-economic emancipation of the marginalized and poor converts

Your Christ-like intervention and sacrifice of:

- 1. \$20 will feed a poor child or an orphan for a month. (\$200 annually).
- 2. \$50 will enable a single mother or widow to feed her family of 3 for a month.
- **3.** \$100 will go for monthly pay for a catechist.
- **4.** \$250 provides 4 goats to maintain a family of four.
- **5.** \$500 will educate a physically challenged child (annually).
- **6.** \$600 will pay the bill for healthcare and family maintenance of a leprosy patient for a year.
- 7. \$700 will fix the roof of a poor man's hut.
- **8.** \$800 will provide a cow to feed an entire family of 5 or more.
- **9.** \$900 will provide a grocery store, and employment to feed a family of 10 with elderly parents and grandparents.
- **10.** \$1,000 will be used for treatment and rehabilitation of a leper.
- **11.** \$2,000 to sponsor a seminarian for a year.
- **12.** \$6,000 will provide a home for a family.
- 13. \$25,000 will build a mission chapel.

Spiritual and Missionary Productivity of MCP: Personal witness:

I was pastor (1980-1984) of St. Paul's mission founded in 1935 by a holy priest and some dedicated nuns, with 18 sub-stations, spread over an area with a radius of 28 miles, located in a jungle. Around midnight one day Kumar a Hindu adult was rushed to my rectory, at the point of death due to cobra-bite on his shoulder. After giving him a powerful, herbal anti-venom stand-by medicine, I had to rush him, already unconscious, to a hospital 30 miles away with three of us on my motor cycle, to give him anti-venom injection to be doubly sure of saving his life.

A year later, the Hindu fundamentalists had the police arrest Kumar and 22 other Hindus to prevent their conversion. Meanwhile the Holy Spirit had transformed Kumar to come forward with a bold defense through his powerful, personal and convincing witness: "It is through the selfless ministry of the priests and the nuns during the past 50 years that this entire area is booming with life (in the jungle) through good education, medical care, moral standards, culture of life and civilization of life, provided by them. But for the Catholic Missionaries we would still live in dark ages. Whereas you, the zealots of Hinduism and your government have never cared for us in our misery and distress. My family and I would have vanished into oblivion had the priest not intervened at the right time to save me from death. As for me and my family Jesus is the only Savior and true God. Any amount of your vile tactics of physical extortion, deprivation of social and economic benefits and social castigation, cannot prevent me from embracing Christianity."

His personal conviction and courageous witness, supported by 22 of his peers, saved our mission from further harassment. Undoubtedly this powerful endorsement from a group of Hindus delivered a rude shock to those who opposed our missionary work. In truth such a manifold ministry through mission school, clinic and orphanage for boys and girls, mostly non-Christians, trying to mirror God's love for the poor and forsaken, was made feasible mainly through Mission Appeal and Propagation of Faith in U.S. and Rome.


