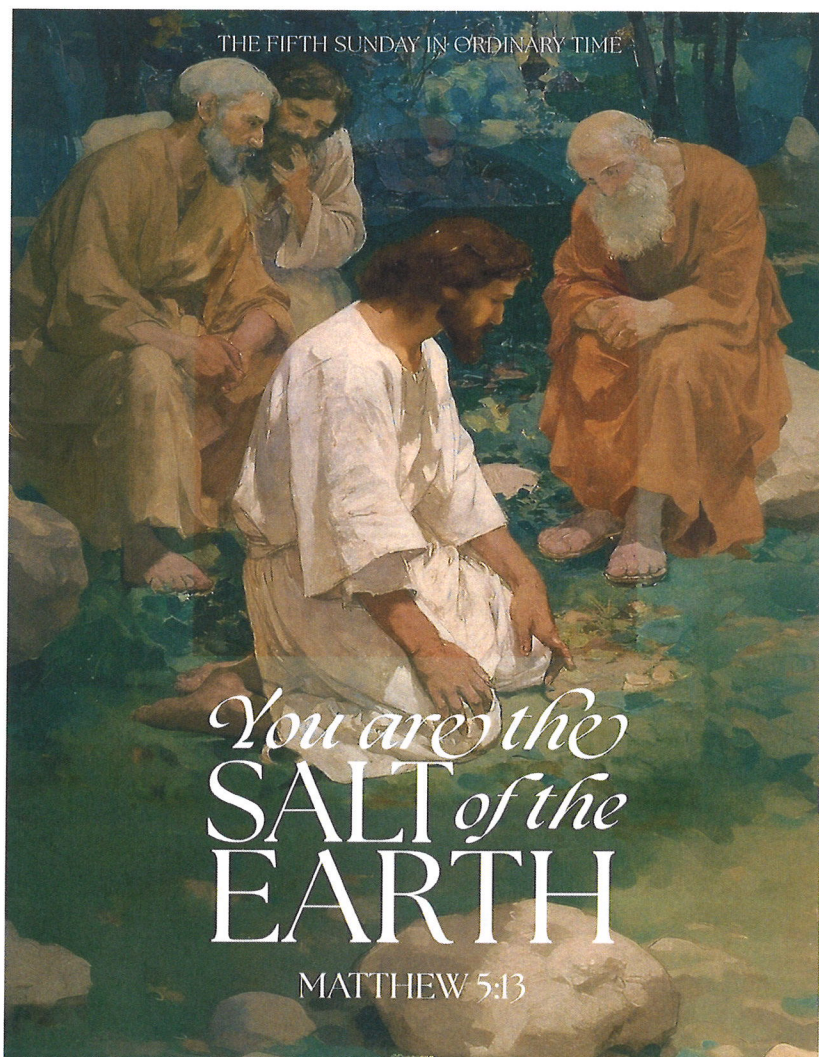

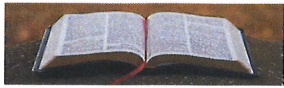

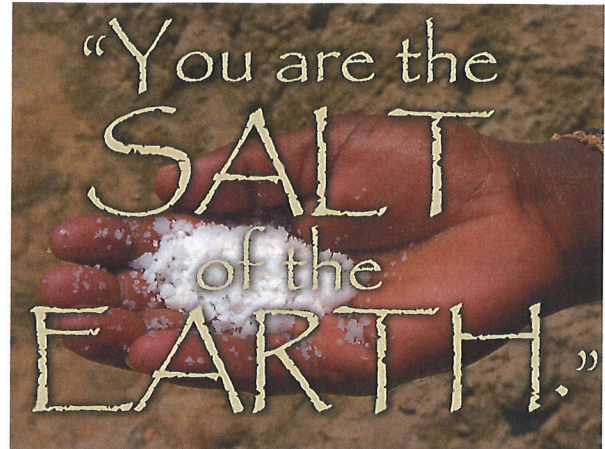

Mountaintops and Perspectives

"Humility is the mother of giants. One sees great things from the valley, only small things from the peak." (G.K. Chesterton)

"A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden."
(St. Matthew)

Chesterton's quote popped up on my flip calendar today, while St. Matthew's quote is from this week's Sunday gospel reading (Mt 5:14). Though they are making a different point, they both use a mountain and its peak to make their points. Then again, they might be more alike than they may first seem.

Chesterton is telling us that in order for us to appreciate the great things in life, we must have a grounded perspective i.e. a view from the valley. We must be humble. In contrast, a view from the mountaintop sees everything as small and insignificant, thus feeding our pride.

Matthew is quoting Jesus, who, of course, constantly preached the need for humility. As a matter of fact, Jesus was preaching from a mountaintop when he said "A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden." His words were a wonderful example of the great things that Chesterton refers to. Those in the valley could see and hear Jesus from their point of view in the valley, appreciating Jesus and the magnitude of his words as they listened with humility.

We know Jesus is the light of the world and he goes on to tell all his disciples and the multitudes of people at the foot of the Mount of Beatitudes that they (we) are also to take his words to the world. At that time, Jews understood from Scripture that Israel was to be a light to the nations, so they (we) are to take the beatitudes that he had just finished presenting and to not only spread that news, but live it.

The world is impacted for better or for worse by the way we live our lives—and our point of view from the mountaintop or valley will go a long way in determining how our lives are lived. To that point, St. John Henry Newman once prayed:

"Let me please you (Lord) in the way you love best by shining on those around me. Let me preach you without preaching, not by my words, but by my example, by the catching force of the sympathetic influence of what I do—the evident fullness of the love my heart bears to you"

Live a life of humility. Live the life of a true disciple.

What to do with your old and unwanted Religious items

A sacramental is a sacred sign that bears resemblance to the sacraments. Sacramentals include religious articles such as scapulars, blessed holy cards, crucifixes, statues, Bibles, missals, Lectionaries, holy water and oils, liturgical vestments, palms, and altar cloths. But what are you to do with them when they break, become tattered and worn out? You can't just discard them. They're almost like people, sacred. They need to be treated properly, even at the end.

The basic rule for the disposal of these items is to burn or to bury them. During the 1800s the Church issued several decisions concerning the this issue. Here are a few examples: A chalice which becomes "unserviceable" is not to be sold but must be used for some other sacred purpose or melted. Vestments, altar cloths, and linens must be destroyed. Polluted or excess holy water must be poured into the ground. Palms are to be burned, and the ashes then used for distribution on Ash Wednesday or returned to the ground. A broken rosary or religious statue normally would be buried. In all, the underlying idea is that when has been dedicated to God should be returned to God. Never should one just "throw out" what has been blessed and dedicated to God.

With the exception of rosaries which can be placed on the rosary rack, please do not bring your unwanted items to the parish nor leave them in the back of the church. I understand the idea of leaving those things for someone else to pick up and use. However, that is not happening, and items just continue to pile up. After a while this becomes a problem because it makes the church look unkept. If you don't have a fire pit to burn the items or have a yard in which to bury them, then ask a neighbor or relative if they can help you dispose of those items. This is precisely what we do with items that are left in the church.

This can be accomplished with the words: *I bequeath to St. Joseph Parish of St. Johns, Michigan, [insert amount being given or percentage of residue] to be used to support the ministry of the parish.* A bequest can be a specific dollar amount, a specific piece of property, a percentage of an estate, or all or part of the residue of an estate. It is always recommended that you consult a lawyer for drafting or amending a will.

How many sacraments does the Roman Catholic Church have?

Answer: 7

The seven sacraments are the sacraments of baptism, reconciliation, marriage, holy orders, anointing of the sick, confirmation, and the Eucharist. Sacraments are beliefs or practices of the Catholics, which are believed to have been instituted by Christ.

According to the Catholic Church, in what year was it founded?

Answer: approximately 33 A.D.

According to Catholic tradition, Jesus founded the Catholic Church when he was about 33 years old. 'You are Peter, a stone; and upon this rock I will build my church; and all the powers of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give you the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven; whatever doors you lock on earth shall be locked in Heaven, and all the doors you open on earth shall be opened in Heaven.'

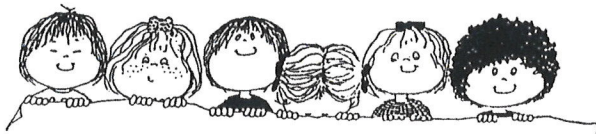

The Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy



First and foremost, Mercy is defined as “ Undeserved Compassionate treatment, A disposition to be kind and forgiving.”

The Old and New Testaments tell us that mercy is God’s love expressed as a response to human suffering. In the words of St. John Paul II, mercy is “love’s second name.” God’s mercy embraces all human suffering, that which is bodily, emotional and spiritual. Above all, divine mercy is a response to the worst of man’s suffering, his alienation from God through sin.

Mercy is most perfectly revealed and made present in Jesus Christ, whom the Father sent into the world to suffer and die on the cross in atonement for our sins. In Christ Crucified we see with our own eyes the mercy of God made visible, the love that goes to the end to overcome sin and death and restore to man the fullness of his dignity as a child of God.

Our works of Mercy give shape to the Church’s desire to bring mercy to the world as a response to the mercy she has so freely and generously received from Christ. In living the works of mercy, the Church shares in God’s action in the world, namely, the restoration, protection and affirmation of the full dignity of the person made in the image of God. For this reason the works of mercy are patterned after the life of Jesus Christ as he ministered to each human being, body and soul, in order to restore him to fullness of life.

What are the seven Corporal Works of Mercy?

The **corporal works of mercy** are actions that help meet the physical needs of others. They are:

- Feeding the hungry
- Giving drink to the thirsty
- Sheltering the homeless
- Visiting the sick
- Visiting prisoners
- Burying the dead
- Giving alms to the poor

Each of these works is a direct response to the needs of others and aligns with the teachings of Christ, who emphasized the importance of caring for those less fortunate. By performing these acts, we not only help those in need but also grow in our own faith and compassion.

The meaning of the **corporal works of mercy** goes beyond mere actions; it challenges us to embody the spirit of love and service that Jesus exemplified. These works serve as a blueprint for participation in the community and fulfilling our Christian obligation to care for the vulnerable.

What are the seven Spiritual Works of Mercy?

The Spiritual Works of Mercy guide Christians in helping their neighbors with their spiritual needs, reflecting Jesus's focus on the spiritual well-being of those he helped.

The seven Spiritual Works of Mercy are:

- Counseling the doubtful
- Instructing the ignorant
- Admonishing the sinner
- Comforting the sorrowful
- Forgiving injuries
- Bearing wrongs patiently
- Praying for the living and the dead

How can we practice the Corporal Works of Mercy today?

Practicing the **works of mercy** in today's world can take many forms. Here are some practical suggestions:

- Organizing food drives for local food banks to help **feed the hungry**.
- Collecting water and supplies for those in need, ensuring we **give drink to the thirsty**.
- Volunteering at shelters to provide support to the **homeless**.
- Visiting hospitals or nursing homes to **visit the sick** and bring comfort.
- Participating in programs that support the **visiting of prisoners** or writing to them through a Pen Pal program and offering friendship.
- Assisting families with burial costs to honor the **burial of the dead**.
- Donating to charities that focus on **giving alms to the poor**.

If you were raised as a child in the parish:

- And are now over 18 years of age
- And you did not fill out a parish registration form

Why is it important to be registered in the parish:

- We can reach you with important information about the parish and it's ministries
- We have a more accurate idea of the number of parishioners we have in the parish.
- It allows us to seek your input and feedback.
- It allows you to formally support the parish financially, since envelopes will be issued to you for your use.
- We can start a sacramental record for you.
- Finally, registering can also help you have a greater sense of belonging to and ownership of the parish.

Please note:

The envelopes you receive when registering will now play an important role in the reception of the sacraments. (i.e. Baptism, Eucharist, Confirmation and Marriage) in the parish. This also includes Godparent selection and Confirmation Sponsors. We're asking all parishioners to get into the habit of using your envelopes in the weekly collection. Even if you give online or don't have anything to put in the envelope, please submit an empty envelope. It will help us know how many registered parishioners attend a given Mass and it will also come in handy for determining if a person, presenting themselves for a sacrament, is attending Mass regularly as is required.

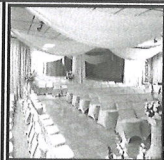
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
